

DUES MATTER!

Few organizations on the Cape provide as robust programming as BCCCC. In fact, BC's Alumni Affairs tells us the Cape Club as its most active in terms of events and activities. From *She*agles Golf League to summer sails; from Edu-Events to private tours of Cape landmarks, we strive to offer opportunities for *all* alumni to participate in activities of interest and engage with one another.

But as of May 1, 2024, half of the Club members have not paid 2024 dues. This nominal fee of \$25.00 not only covers a minimal overhead but allows Cape alumni to provide financial support to students from the Cape who matriculate at our alma mater. Membership also confers early-bird registration to landmark events such as a private tour of the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution.

COMMENCEMENT 2024

Nearly 3,000 students, graduate and undergraduate, are expected to attend the 148th commencement ceremony on May 20, 2024. A dramatic change since Rev. Robert J. Fulton, S.J. presided over the first commencement ceremony in 1877.

Boston College opened on Harrison Avenue in Boston's South End in 1863, welcoming its first students in September 1864. The course of study was designed to last seven years, but it wasn't until fourteen years after its founding that BC could finally mount a formal graduation ceremony attended by twelve young graduates.


The first commencement ceremony extended over three nights in June 1877. It was attended by Massachusetts Governor Alexander H. Rice, who was instrumental in obtaining the land for the South End campus, and the first Archbishop of Boston, John Joseph Williams. Seven of the graduates became priests and four entered the medical profession. The number of graduates fluctuated between 10 and 20 annually for the remainder of the 19th century.

The opening of BC's new campus in Chestnut Hill (spring semester 1913) enabled the first commencement ceremonies to be held on the Heights that year, on June 17, 1913. At that graduation, 79 candidates received their degrees.


