HC BEATS BC - UNFAIRLY!

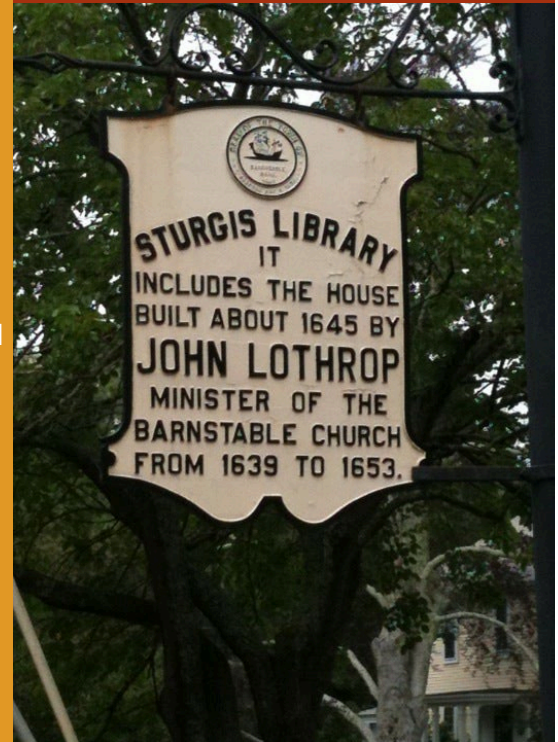
On August 21, 2023, the Holy Cross Crusaders, dressed in regal purple, defeated Boston College in the first annual Cape Cod Alumni Ryder Cup match by a score of 18 to 14. The BC Club of Cape Cod has filed a protest with the Massachusetts Diversity Council. HC was unable to find 4 women players to participate on their 16-member team because of Admissions problems at the Worcester "safety" school. This situation forced 2 BC women to compete against men. The two teams agreed to meet again in 2024. HC pledged to somehow find 4 women players.

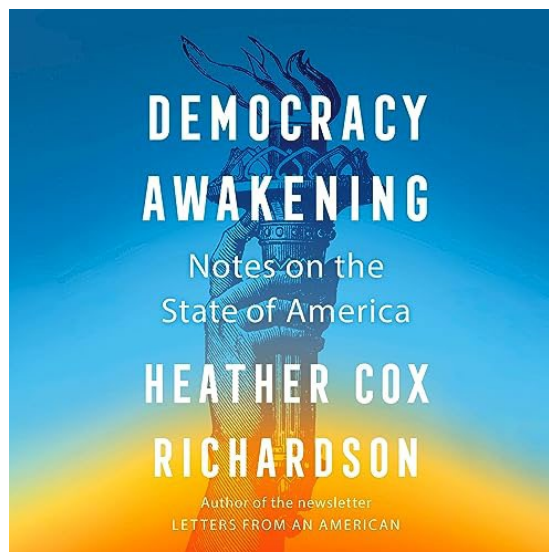

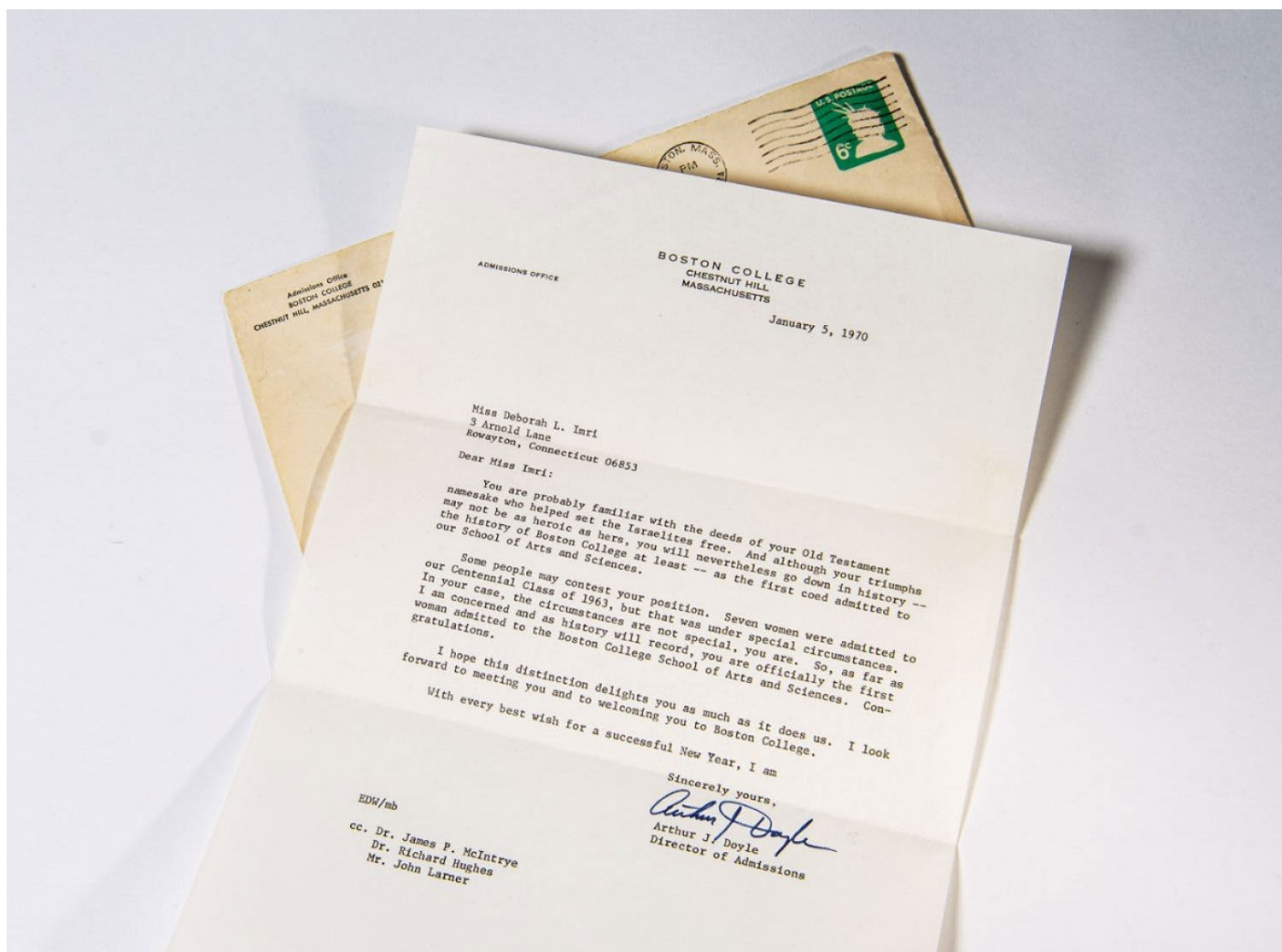


LEARN FROM RENOWNED BC PROFESSOR HEATHER COX RICHARDSON

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: ARTHUR J. DOYLE, A&S '64; GA&S '67



The signature on the letter to the first woman admitted to the College of Arts and Sciences, Deborah Imri, was that of then Director of Admissions, Arthur J. Doyle. In the fall of 1970, 247 women matriculated at BC as members of the first coed A&S Class and 17 women were admitted to SOM. Today, Arthur is an active member of the BC Club of Cape Cod.

Doyle received his undergraduate degree from BC in 1964 and a Masters in teaching in 1966 (and later earned an MBA from Northwestern). In 1967, he was appointed assistant director of financial aid at BC. Two years later, Arthur was named Director of Admissions (a post in which he served until 1972).

Arthur dedicated his career to higher education, serving as Vice President for College Success Implementation at the College Board as well as other assignments across the country for the Board. He also served as a consultant for the Overseas Schools Program of the U.S. State Department and a reviewer for the Office of Postsecondary Education in the U.S. Department of Education.

Today, Arthur and his wife, Susan, live in East Milton and East Sandwich. They have three children, one of whom, Megan, graduated from BC in 2008. They also have five grandchildren (more Eagles in the future?). Of his involvement in the Club, Arthur says, "My years on the Heights, both as a student and an administrator, were among the most memorable of my life. Being engaged in the BC Club of the Cape allows me many opportunities to reconnect with old and new friends who share deep attachments to our alma mater."
